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PRESIDENT'S REPORT

E. Connor Kelly

Dear Members,

Vision, Viability, and Vision are the tenets on which we are developing our next strategic plan. The beginning of the 2022/23 year offered several Research Committee and Professional Development Committee events for members that were well attended. The 2022 AGM in October was an opportunity to pursue some excellent PD opportunities with Bonnie Meekums, further our cultural understanding with Sharon Carpenter and offerings from our newest committee, the Multicultural and Diversity Committee. We spent time dancing our goals in community at the AGM.

The second half of the year, DTAA had its first in-person PD offering since 2019. In the future both inperson and online events will be organised in order to allow us to reach the breadth of our membership across diverse locations.

In March, DTAA held a Special General Meeting (SGM) to explain the updated constitution to prepare the membership for a vote. The updated constitution was accepted by more than the 70% votes required and is the foundational document that guides our governance processes and procedures.

The Workplace Development Committee (WDC) continues to lobby NDIA/NDIS for inclusion of dance movement therapy as a listed service. Our proposal continues to be under review. Meanwhile, The WDC has created a guideline for DMTs in Australia identifying the services that can be claimed and under which category they are located.

The Board is working on plans for communication strategies including establishing a regular Communications Committee and offering summaries of each board meeting's Minutes to the membership.

In November 2023, I will be attending the ADTA annual conference to represent DTAA on the International panel to discuss issues that dance movement therapists face at this time. I hope to learn from other regions of the world and bring inspiration and tools back to DTAA.

I thank you for the privilege to serve you in this role as I complete my term as President.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

Treasurer and Convener: Robyn Price Committee Members: Cath Rummery, Assistant Treasurer

ACTIVITIES, MILESTONES AND ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE IN 2022-2023

- Delivered a profit of \$16,895 for the 2022-23 Financial Year with a balance of \$102,098 in the bank as at 30 June 2023.
- Continued to manage the DTAA's finances conservatively and increase the balance in the savings account to take advantage of increasing interest rates. This saving is in preparation for a website upgrade and numerous marketing projects that will benefit all members of the organisation in the coming financial year. Once the 2023-2025 Strategic Plan is completed, responsible spending decisions will be clearer and more easily made.
- Trained Assistant Treasurer, Cath Rummery in all finance-related applications, processes and reporting requirements. Cath was previously Treasurer for the IDTIA and has been documenting all procedures during the training process.
- The Bookkeeper, Melissa at Magnolia Bookkeeping has done an excellent job supporting our record keeping and reporting. We may review the bookkeeping software in the new financial year as QuickBooks has had several issues that have taken several hours (mostly my time) to resolve.
- Managed the Administrator's hours and priorities and negotiated an increase in rate and hours per week to accommodate the increase in membership and general workload.
- Oversaw the Westpac Bank's requirement to re-identify all office holders Australian government requirements.
- Fees Update:
 - This year, as in past years, the same thorough process of modelling was carried out, comparing comparative organisations and offering two alternative fee schedules for the Board to discuss. These schedules took into account our financial situation and the projected cost of doing business in the coming financial year. Our costs have increased by 10% across all areas of the business and so fees were increased.
 - This year, a number of other financial stresses were at play for our members; approximately nine Australian members faced their first year paying fees for two organisations after DTAA left PACFA as a Member Association; the global economy was troubled and work opportunities affected in some areas, and a large group of New Zealand members expressed their concern about the fee increase. After two meetings with the NZ group, the Board proposed we revert to a two-tier fee schedule for Australian and non-Australian members. This takes into account the exchange rate from different currencies. While this adds cost to the administration time, we will maintain this schedule for the next financial year and review it in 18 months' time.

- The Finance Procedures document continues to be updated as needed (as per the DTAA's Strategic Plan)
- The Treasurer continued to provide advice, budgeting and financial support for the CPD team when creating events, and for projects run by DTAA Committees or working parties. All events again achieved a profit in the past 12 months.

- Support the DTAA Board and all its committees with financial analysis, modelling, budgets and pricing recommendations.

ACTIVITIES, MILESTONES AND ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE GOVERNANCE COMMITTEE IN 2022-2023

This year a review of the constitution was undertaken, and appropriate changes were recommended to the Board. The changes

were subsequently approved and incorporated. One major change was to the rewording of the clause describing the 'Structure of the Board' and the creation of a By Law that defines the current Board structure. Putting the Structure of the Board into a By Law allows each new President/Board to organise the Board in a way that will best serve the Strategic Plan for their tenure.

The DTAA Governance Committee brought the updated constitution to the membership in early 2023. On March 14, 2023, a Special General Meeting (SGM) was held at which the eligible membership approved the updated document.

COMMITTEE PLANS FOR 2023-2024:

The Governance Committee will continue with its regular work, which occurs mostly behind the scenes. S K Lauffenburger has stepped down as Convener and Mioi Forster-Nakayama as DTAA Secretary now heads the committee. The major task awaiting the Governance Committee in 2023-24 will be the updating of the DTAA Constitutional By Laws.

ACTIVITIES, MILESTONES AND ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE PROFESSIONAL MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE IN 2022-2023

With the help of Administrator Donna Parker, the application forms for membership were significantly simplified.

- 1. A simple chart containing Practice (leading) hours with concurrent supervision was created to replace the complex charts in Section 5.
- 2. A supervision report which included the applicant's capacity with the competencies was created.

Both items were designed to simplify the application as well as the review processes.

In order to keep pace with industry standards (as required by bodies such as NDIS), DTAA has added a Police Check or Working with Vulnerable People/Children card OR the equivalent (by state, territory or country) to be submitted with the application form.

The PMC has also worked on membership renewal processes. To keep pace with requirements for increasing professionalism made by insurance schemes such as NDIS (Aus) or ACC (NZ), the DTAA now asks members to submit documentation of CPD and supervision hours accumulated during the preceding Financial Year with their renewal request. Simplified forms, modelled on PACFA's logs for CPD and Supervision, are now available for downloading by the renewing member. They are available on the website IF the member wants to keep a running log on their own computer. At the time of renewal the member simply uploads the two forms onto the renewal form.

The PMC also reviewed the application process following the request that the DTAA adopt an 'ANZACATA" style approach to un-evaluated acceptance upon graduation from an accredited training program. The PMC provided the following rationale for maintaining its current approach:

- Transparency and good governance is required for DTAA's membership in important bodies such as AHPA, NDIS, and other insurances. They want to know, and be assured, as to who and why we accept a member.
- If a member is subject to a complaint/grievance, the DTAA needs to be able to have the capacity to support that member during the complaints/grievances processes. This capacity includes fuller knowledge of the person's training and practice, as well as DTAA's rationale for accepting the person as a practicing member.

• Aligning with ANZACATA's approach means accepting only those DMT graduates who have an MA in DMT. This eliminates graduates of 3 out of 5 of our training programs. This seems detrimental to the growth of the profession as well as somewhat elitest with regards to the needs of our students/trainees.

For these reasons DTAA will continue with the current application process.

Finally, the PMC has continued its general business of reviewing Associate, Provisional Professional and Clinical membership applications. During the 2022-2023 year, the committee accepted:

COMMITTEE PLANS FOR 2023-2024:

- Ensure the content of professional development (PD) events is supported by evidence-informed practice, addresses DTAA competencies, and meets the needs of DTAA's members, at all levels of experience, and in all locations.
- Create a program of PD events that features both local and international presenters, delivered either in person or online.
- Provide events of varying lengths to improve access to relevant learning.
- Offer events or develop content that is relevant to people working in related fields, such as creative arts, somatic and psychotherapy expanding the reach of our profession.
- Develop a process for recording short workshops and offering them to members either free of charge or for a low fee.
- Collaborate with the Communications Committee to design content suitable for DTAA's social media channels, and to meet the content needs of other relevant committees.
- Expand the committee to include a core organising group with at least one representative from each of Australia and New Zealand. Recruit members in specific locations to assist with in-person events or technical hosting/support.
- Complete the documentation of PDC processes and reporting.





TRAINING AND EDUCATION COMMITTEE

ACTIVITIES, MILESTONES AND ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE TRAINING AND EDUCATION COMMITTEE IN 2022-2023

The Training and Education Committee (TEC) has gathered "maps to the competencies" submitted by each DMT Training Organisation in this Australasian region. The TEC is currently matching those maps to the

DTAA competencies. The process of matching curriculum and competencies will allow the Board, the Professional Membership Committee, and the Competencies Committee the ability to evaluate and understand each training program and the graduates they produce.

As the Australasian region has a number of DMT training organisations, each of whom award a variety of degree/certificate levels (e.g. Diploma through to Masters), a number of questions have emerged during this process. One issue that has emerged is with regard to teaching expectations and measurement against the DTAA competencies for each degree/certificate. The TEC is working to determine what could/should be expected from a Diploma program versus a Masters degree program. Following on from this is the question as to how these expectations relate to level of DTAA membership available to the graduates from each program. The TEC anticipates additional questions will be encountered as this process continues.

COMMITTEE PLANS FOR 2023-2024:

In 2024 the TEC hopes to meet with the training organisation directors to discuss and more effectively ascertain how to measure, approve and support effective training for new DMTs.

In 2024 the TEC will also look at the gaps in training that have been found during the mapping process. It will be important then to consider how Continuing Professional Development courses can meet the gaps. For example, a key gap is trauma training.

TRAINING PROVIDERS COMMITTEE

ACTIVITIES, MILESTONES AND ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE TRAINING PROVIDERS COMMITTEE IN 2022-2023



The TPC met four times over the past year and plan to continue to meet quarterly for the next 12 months.

We have been working with the Supervision Task Force on the project that addressed the parameters of Supervision for both members of the DTAA and students. There are still some changes that will be implemented by certain organisations that have larger infrastructure and timeframes to work with.

All training courses are working successfully with the Supervision and Placement Excel spreadsheet that was collaboratively designed by the TPC in 2022 and accepted by the PMC.

We are encouraging students to complete this throughout their studies to educate them towards the requirements of DTAA's Provisional Professional membership level.

The TPC is currently discussing new ideas and ways to assist students complete some of their Supervision hours through a proposed program facilitated by the DTAA. It has been unanimously expressed that students need to see tangible incentives for joining the DTAA as students, and this partially-funded and volunteer-based project may address this. We are still awaiting a response from the Board and/or executive.

COMMITTEE PLANS FOR 2023-2024:

The TPC plans to pursue various ways of engaging students in the operations of DTAA committees.

The TPC is keen to have a great communication channel between the Training and Education Committee and the TPC. There is a noted increase in student numbers across Australasia and the committee would like to harness this and encourage students from all courses to become involved in appropriate DTAA sub-committees.

ACTIVITIES, MILESTONES AND ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE SUPERVISION TASK FORCE IN 2022-2023

In February 2022, the Supervision Task Force (STF) was commissioned by DTAA President E Connor Kelly as a response to issues and concerns raised confidentially by DTAA Professional and Clinical members who were providing supervision for trainees and new graduates. As reported for the 2022 AGM, a number of policies were developed and approved by the DTAA Board.

This year, the STF has worked to disseminate information around the policies as well as assist training programs to implement them. There is a recognition that both education, information, and time will be needed in this process.

For these reasons, the STF initiated a *Supervision Community Discussion Forum*, open to all Professional and Clinical Supervisor members (in other words, those currently recognised by DTAA as being potential or current supervisors), and the members of the Training Program Committee. This activity by the STF is to ensure that both concerns and information can be openly discussed, allowing the STF to further identify future policy needs. The SCD Forum, held in June 2023, was well-attended and fostered significant discussion. It was agreed that more discussion and collaboration on this topic is needed.

COMMITTEE PLANS FOR 2023-2024:

The STF will expand in its membership, with SK Lauffenburger stepping off the committee and other members joining. These include Anne Hurst, Meredith Lucy, and Sally Denning. The first project will be to schedule and hold additional Discussion Forums.

Additional recommendations include making the Task Force a permanent Sub-Committee on the DTAA Board. In that capacity over the next two years, it will:

- Develop Policy for Supervision of all Members.
- Develop recommended Policy for Supervision within Training programmes.
- Offer a series of Supervision Sessions where members can sample the different styles of DTAA's Clinical Supervisors.

MULTICULTURAL AND DIVERSITY COMMITTEE

ACTIVITIES, MILESTONES AND ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE MULTICULTURAL AND DIVERSITY COMMITTEE IN 2022-2023

In its meetings this year, the Multicultural and Diversity Committee (MDC) has identified the following issues and needs:

- Development of cultural awareness workshops specific to DMT.
- Recommendations to include languages spoken other than English by dance therapists to encourage and support people from other cultures when they access the DTAA website, particularly as they search for a DMT on the membership page.
- Recommendation that a translation app be included/endorsed for workshops, discussions and meetings.
- Work with the Publications and Communication Committee as well as the Professional Development Committee on the above needs.

COMMITTEE PLANS FOR 2023-2024:

The MDC will continue to identify topics that need to be addressed as the DTAA moves Dance Movement Therapy forward. A timely topic is accessing NDIS to work with participants who are culturally diverse. The MDC will create a budget for the 2023-2025 Strategic Plan, particularly with respect to the website language recommendations.

ACTIVITIES, MILESTONES AND ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE WORKPLACE DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE IN 2022-2023



National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS)-Australia:

After almost two years since DTAA's submission of the application to the NDIS (Cathy Howard, the Registration Team of the NDIS Quality and Safety Commission), the DTAA has not received a final decision by the NDIA/NDIS. In October 2021, the DTAA submitted its 200 page application documenting DTAA's professionalism and asking for **recognition of DMT as a profession providing therapeutic services by the NDIS/NDIA**.

- The WDC re-submitted our application to the NDIS Registration Team in October 2022.
- From November 2022 to March 2023, the WDC launched a campaign called the 'Make DMT Visible to the NDIS', asking the Australian DTAA members to reach out to their local MPs. Thus far, the 22 local MPs and other government officials responded to these members. Some MPs followed up with MP Bill Shorten's office (the Minister for the NDIS) to further this request.
- In April, the DTAA's Treasurer, Robyn Price met MP Shorten at a local NDIS meeting and requested that he personally follow up with our application.
- In May 2023, the DTAA received an update on our application from the NDIS Quality and Safety Commission. The NDIS Commission and the National Disability Insurance Agency (they are the separate government bodies) jointly discussed that our application would be now considered at the level of the Technical Advisory Branch of the NDIA (as in July 2023).

Currently, the WDC is finalising the guidelines for NDIS-related practice in Australia. The NDIS is a complicated scheme and legally binding for professionals. Hence the practitioners who work with NDIS participants need to carefully consider the practicality of working under NDIS, including such issues as pricing your services.

Gumboot Friday - New Zealand

<u>Gumboot Friday</u> provides free counselling for children. A NZ member initiated a discussion with Gumboot Friday to ask them to accept DTAA members as registered providers for their clients. The WDC members will have a joint meeting at the end of August to find out more details.

Student Seminar

The WDC created a student's handbook and launched it in November 2022. An annual student seminar took place at the same time with 15 students participating. In this seminar board members also discussed how the students can become involved in

the DTAA's activities and committees. Invitations to join any committees except for the Executive and Professional Membership Committees were opened to the student members. Another seminar is taking place in September 2023. The WDC hopes to organise a student seminar regularly and will inquire into the interests of the students who the DTAA believes will form the future of our profession.

The Guideline on Private Practice

The WDC regularly receives inquiries related to private practice, thus the WDC alongside DTAA Board members created a guideline for working in private practice. <u>The Guideline on Private Practice</u> explains recommendations, legal issues, required forms etc. for those who would like to start their own private practice. While this document does not limit a practitioner's business, the Guideline draws the practitioner's attention to ethical and legal considerations and imparts practical tips. The WDC will continue to work on updating this document in the coming year as additional practical information related to the other regions, including New Zealand, needs to be incorporated.

COMMITTEE PLANS FOR 2023-2024:

The WDC will focus on **visibility** in the year 2023-2024. In our strategic planning meeting on May 2023, we concluded that there should be a focus on collaborating more with other peak organisations and other creative arts therapy professionals.

Visibility:

Australia - The NDIS

- The WDC will continue to pursue the DTAA's application with the Technical Advisory Branch of the NDIA and seek their final decision.
- The WDC will approach trauma informed organisations such as the Blue Knot Foundation and seek how our professions can be visible in the context of the evidence-based body-focussed approach to trauma.

New Zealand

We will work towards visibility of our profession in New Zealand. For example, we will pursue how the Accident Compensation Corporation (ACC) and <u>Gumboot Friday</u> can recognise our profession. We will identify the existing issues and clarify and plan our approaches accordingly.

Student Seminar

The WDC will continue to conduct a student seminar annually. A feedback form will be sent to the training providers after the 2023 Student Seminar and we will find out a best possible time for a seminar and what content might be more useful for the current students.

Conducting a work-related survey

For the WDC to clarify our goals and activities, we would like to conduct a work-related survey and identify what issues DMTs in Australasia are currently facing.



PUBLICATIONS COMMITTEE

ACTIVITIES, MILESTONES AND ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE PUBLICATIONS COMMITTEE IN 2022-2023

The Publications Committee (PC) has functioned with a team approach rather than as a committee. As such it has brought together different helpers for each publication. The PC is very grateful for the ad hoc assistance that has been received as this assistance has sustained DTAA's ability to publish the journal, *Moving On*.

Another area covered by the publications committee has been the sales of DTAA books.

COMMITTEE PLANS FOR 2023-2024:

As the needs of the members and subscribers have changed, DTAA believes that trialling a new way of meeting publication goals is needed. Finding a new way is also necessitated by the need to recruit more people to work on publications.

A suggestion is to slow down the publication process and hopefully provide more time and space for a small but enthusiastic group to produce their best work. This will require careful planning including the following steps:

- Through discussions, decide on topic or focus that the team wants to address.
- Call for papers from the general membership, as well as outside of DTAA.
- As papers come in, the team begins work on editing what they have received.
- When first paper is fully edited, it will be published under the journal title on the DTAA website.
- Follow with this process with other articles as they come in.
- When four have been published on the website, consider forming them into a journal, adding an editorial and complimentary shorter writings .
- Finally, publish this collection.

The PC suggests that holding a writing workshop and forming a writing group could be a useful and interesting way to begin this process. This suggestion allows the possibility of getting the work of Australasian DMTs published.
